Monday, November 9 - "I called on Your name, 0 Lord, from the lowest pit. You have heard my voice: 'Do not hide Your ear from my sighing, from my cry for help.' You drew near on the day I called on You, and said, 'do not fear!"' (Lam. 3:55-57). Most biblical scholars believe Lament ations was written by the prophet Jeremiah. The book contains five poems of lamenting over the destruction of Jerusalem, of which Jeremiah witnessed firsthand Jeremiah could certainly relate to being in a pit. "They lowered Jeremiah by ropes into the cistern; it had no water in it, only mud, and Jeremiah sank down into the mud" (Jer. 38:6, NIV). What was Jeremiah's crime? He was telling the people what God told him to say: speaking of the impending demise of Jerusalem at the hands of the Babylonians. Joseph too was thrown into a cistern by his jealous brothers, and his crime was sharing the dream God had given him. Both of these men were obedient to God, yet each of them ended up in the pit. At some point in your life, you too will find yourself in the pit, sinking down in the muck and mire and wondering if there is any way out Perhaps you are there today. When you find yourself in the pit, the first thing to do is to call upon the name of the Lord. God tells us, "It shall come to pass that before they call, I will answer; and while they are still speaking, I will hear" (lIsa. 65:24). In Jeremiah's case, the king sent thirty men to pull him out. I can tell you with all certainty that the King of kings wants to help lift you out of your pit. He will draw near to you the day you call out to Him, and He will tell you: "Do not fear." David said, "I waited patiently for the Lord; He turned to me and heard my cry. He lifted me out of the slimy pit, out of the mud and mire; He set my feet on a rock and gave me a firm place to stand" (Ps. 40:1-2, NIV). If you are in the pit now, cry out to the Lord and then look up. You'll recognize Jesus; He will be the One with His arms stretched out towards you waiting to lift you out and get you on firm ground.

Tuesday, November 10 - "He will cover you with his feathers, and under His wings you will find refuge; His faithfulness will be your shield and rampart. You will not fear the terror of night, nor the arrow that flies by day, nor the pestilence that stalk $s$ in the darkness, nor the plague that destroy s at midday" (Ps. 91:4-6 NIV). The psalmist here gives us the best reason ever not to live in fear. "You will not fear" is a declarative statement. How can he make such a bold statement? Because he trusts in the Lord and who He is. "I will say of the Lord, 'He is my refuge and my fortress, my God, in whom I trust'" (Ps. 91:2, NV). Is the Lord your refuge, your fortress, someone you can trust? I can assure you that is what He wants to be. "If you make the Most High your dwelling-even the Lord, who is my refuge-then no harm will befall you, no disaster will come near your tent" (Ps. 91:9-10, NIV). God has given you the same opportunity to declare what you believe. "You will also declare a thing, and it will be established for you; so light will shine on your ways" (Job 22:28). Your tongue can declare your future and that of your family. God has given us a free will, and we can speak life or death into any situation. Solomon tells us, "The tongue has the power of life and death, and those who love it will eat its fruit" (Prov. $18: 21$, NIV). What have you to fear today? Why not declare life over your situation today? God has given us a great promise at the end of Psalm 91:15-16 (NIV) (emphasis added), "He will call upon me, and I will answer him; I will be with him in trouble, I will deliver him and honor him. With long life will I satisfy him and show him my salvation." God has made this promise very personal, three times saying, "I will." The question now becomes, will you? When you feel trouble coming on, will you call upon the Lord? As He promises, He will be with you! "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present hel $p$ in trouble. Therefore we will not fear" (Ps. 46:1-2, NV).
Wednesday, November 11 - "My son, preserve sound judgment and discernment, do not let them out of your sight; they will be life for you, an ornament to grace your neck. Then you will go on your way in safety, and your foot will not stumble; when you lie down, you will not be afraid; when you lie down, your sleep will be sweet" (Prov. 3:21-24, NIV). The key to not being afraid, according to Solomon, is sound judgment and discernment How does one get and ret ain these treasures? A good place to start is the controlling of your tongue. Solomon tells us, "When words are many, sin is not absent, but he who holds his tongue is wise" (Prov. 10:19, NIV). A phrase coined during World War II was "loose lips might sink ships." This slogan was used by the US Office of War Information in an effort to limit useful information from falling into the enemy's hands. That phrase is still relevant today because you face an enemy who loves to use your words against you. Discernment is knowing when to speak and when to be quiet. Don't ever rush to judgment, and always collect your thoughts before you let the tongue loose. If we are contestants on a game show, then speed may be required, but for most everything else we should exercise extreme control over our mouths. Solomon also tells us, "Do not be quick with your mouth, do not be hasty in your heart to utter anything before God. God is in heaven and you are on earth, so let your words be few" (Eccles. 5:2, NIV). Jesus's half-brother James tells us, "Everyone should be quick to listen, slow to speak and slow to become angry" (James 1:19, NIV). The other great advice from James is concerning wisdom and how $t$ get it: "If any of you lacks wisdom, you should ask God, who gives generously to all without finding fault, and it will be given to you" (James 1:5, NIV). God knows exactly what obstacles you are going to face tod ay, so why not ask Him for wisdom in how to approach each and every day? Jesus told us, "How much more will your Father in heaven give good gifts to those who ask him!" (Matt. 7:11, NIV). One area where speaking continually is not only permitted but encouraged is when you are speaking to your Heavenly Father. He loves a chatter box!

Thursday, November 12 - "Peace I leave with you; My peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid" (John 14:27, NV). There are very few things in the world that you cannot put a price on, but the peace Jesus speaks of here is one of them. The good news for believers is that peace, like salvation, is a free gift. Those who have received it in unsettling situations realize how valuable it is but for most of the world, they have no idea what they are missing. Satan plays on your fears, but one drop of peace will totally diffuse any fear. "And the God of peace will crush Satan under your feet shortly" (Rom. 16:20). Just as light trumps darkness, blessings trump curses, so peace trumps fear." The Lord said to Moses, 'Tell Aaron and his sons, this is how you are to bless the Israelites. Say to them: The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make his face shine upon you and be gracious to you; the Lord turn his face toward you and give you peace ${ }^{\prime \prime \prime}$ (Num. 6:22-26, NIV). Of all the things God could give the Israelites, He gave them peace. This should speak volumes to us as to exactly how precious peace is. So how does one acquire peace? Fortunate ely, Paul tells us exactly how we obtain it: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thank sgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 4:6-7, NVV). Webster defines petition as "a solemn, earnest plea or request to a superior or to those in authority." So we are to take everything (big and small) to God in prayer via a petition. Once you present your requests to God, you set them down at His feet. Then you are to thank the Lord. The net result of this (transaction, if you will) is the peace of God will fill your heart if you can leave that request at His feet and not go back and pick it up. Do not be afraid of the challenges you face today, but take them all to the Lord in prayer.
